AMERICAN ROBIN

black head & streaky wings

yellow beak

orange belly

PALM WARBLER

black & rust-colored streaks in wings

rusty cap

wagging tail

yellow body

RED-TAILED HAWK

red tail

brown head

white throat

yellow feet & large talons

AMERICAN CROW

all black body & glossy feathers

distinctive "caw-caw" call

squared tail

GREAT EGRET

black long legs

white body

long, yellow, daggerlike bill

long S-curved neck that is tucked when flying

NORTHERN MOCKINGBIRD

mimics other birds' songs

long tail

pale gray upper body

white belly

NORTHERN CARDINAL

short, wide bill

black mask & throat

male

female

red body

tan body with red streaks
